EDUCATION

Operational funding for public schools is the responsibility of the State, while funding for school construction, equipment, and debt are County responsibilities. Historically, State funding has not been sufficient to meet all needs so counties provide current expense funding to schools as well. Catawba County's current expense funding assists the County's three public school systems with operating needs, including both instructional programs and support services. The School Budget and Fiscal Control Act requires the County to fund each school system the same amount per pupil based on average daily membership figures certified by the State and based on the highest attendance figures of the first two out of three months of the school year. North Carolina General Statutes allow the Board of Commissioners to allocate current expense funding in a variety of ways. Catawba County has always provided a lump sum amount per pupil and left the decision how to spend with the school boards.

Like public schools, the State is responsible for funding community college operations, while counties are responsible for maintenance, capital, and general facility operations.

The budget includes increased current expense funding for public schools and CVCC of \$1,105,987. A 3 percent or \$47 per pupil increase is included for public schools in current expense funding resulting in a total increase of \$927,391 or 2.5 percent due to continued student loss. The table at the top of the page shows the impact for each school system. Barring any major changes in funding for public schools by other counties, the increased funding is expected to improve the County's ranking from 19th to 18th in total current expense funding and 56th to 52nd in per pupil funding.

Each school system uses local current expense dollars differently but this increase will help the systems at least in part manage a statutory maximum class size restriction for grades K-3. Previously the systems were able to use flexibility in State funding allotments to pay for teachers in art, music, and physical education. Now these funds will be required to fund additional classroom teachers to meet the mandate, adding pressure to local current expense needs to help cover art, music, and physical education. Originally this restriction was scheduled to take place in the coming school year, but recently passed House Bill 13 extended the deadline to August 2018 to give schools an additional year to plan for class size reductions and hire new teachers.

A \$178,596 or 4.4 percent increase is included for CVCC primarily driven by increased operating costs for the Workforce Solutions Center scheduled to open in the Spring of 2018.

The budget also includes \$1.3M for the K-64 Initiative funded by a two-year diversion of future debt service dollars freed by the timing of debt issuance for school construction projects compared to the original cash flow.
