She told the students that the judges were very impressed with the simplicity of the winning video and the fact that it illustrated many different things that could distract a driver.

The contest was sponsored by the Catawba County Child Fatality Prevention Team, Community Protection Team and Catawba County Youth Council. The purpose of the contest was to raise awareness of the dangers of common driving distractions, including texting, talking on a cell phone, listening to loud music or driving with too many passengers. Although it is against the law in North Carolina to text while driving, many people do it.

Distracted driving, including the use of a cell phone, is a factor in nearly 80 percent of accidents, according to a study published by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute.

A September 2010 report by the U.S. Transportation Department said 5,474 people died in 4,898 crashes linked to distracted driving last year, which is down slightly from 5,838 deaths in 5,307 crashes in 2008. Of those in 2009, about 1,000 involved cell phones. Distracted drivers were a factor in 16 percent of crashes and deaths in both years.
