The Quarter Century Club's active members traditionally receive a gift as they enter the club. This year, active club members received a pottery piece in the shape of Catawba County made by Tammy Leigh Brooks, a Hickory native who began taking pottery classes at the Hickory Museum of Art in 1992 and says it completely changed her life. Within a couple of years, she quit a telecommunications job of 16 years to become a full-time potter. She says she "found her niche" in 2007 when creating roosters became her focus, later adding hens, peeps and guineas. She began teaching part-time at the CVCC Potters' Workshop in January 2011 and is sharing her talents and "tricks of the trade" with adult students of all ages and backgrounds.
