










Sherrills Ford Elementary Welcomes the SFTFOL Readers

Cheryl Cole and Barbara MacArthur, volunteers of FOSFTL, visited Sherrills Ford Elementary on October 26th. These ladies read the book entitled <u>Something Shiny, Something Round</u>, by Julie Goulis and John Ferguson. This school year there are five second-grade classrooms/teachers and currently 86 second-graders at SFE. The

teacher combined students together from three of the classrooms for a reading presented by Cheryl Cole, while the other two classes were read to by Barbara MacArthur.

This story book is about using one's imagination to lead to extraordinary adventures. A boy and his friends find a hubcap buried in the snow and dream up all sorts of wild and creative journeys centering on this ordinary object. The story itself ignites a time of sharing and conversation that is so important to a child's life.

Each classroom received the gift of the book to expand their classroom library and to promote the love for reading. Each student was given a bookmark with a picture of the book and information about our Sherrills Ford Branch Library.

Exciting Changes Coming to Library Programing



The big news at the library this month is that you will no longer see print editions of newspapers on display. Instead, the library is going digital! A newspaper streaming service called NewsBank will allow library patrons to access hundreds of newspapers, including full -color editions of The Charlotte Observer and the Hickory Daily Record, along with national and foreign -

language papers. What's more, NewsBank offers read-aloud features and a citation tool. Using a library card, patrons can access NewsBank from the library or on their own devices. Try it out for yourself! Go to www.catawbacountync.gov/library and click on Read Newspapers Online. Library staff are also ready to help.


November Friendly Krafts-4-Kids Salutes the Sturdy Oak

From Sue Greene comes this information on the latest Krafts-4-Kits:


In November, the Krafts-4-Kids project is a tribute to oak trees. The take-home project is a hand-print acorn to cut out and decorate. This is an easy kit that can be completed by all ages, (maybe with a little assistance). Trace your hand, date the back, and save it in a scrapbook so that in a few years, you can look back and see how much you've grown! Supplies needed are scissors, pencil, black marker, glue stick, and a pink pencil or crayon.

Books to accompany this Kraft are <u>Someday a Tree</u>, by Eve Bunting, and <u>Oak Leaf</u>, by John Sandford. Both are available through the Catawba County Library system with your patron card.

A Luggage Drive for Children in Foster Care



During the month of November, the library will host a suitcase drive to benefit children in foster care. Due to lack of resources, unexpected moves, and the need to quickly gather all of their belongings for transport, garbage bags have become the unofficial suitcase for children in foster care. Imagine the confusion and

embarrassment of carrying everything you own in a garbage bag, while everything in your life is drastically changing. The library seeks to help provide dignity and an easy way to keep belongings together through a suitcase drive. All Catawba County library locations will be collecting new or gently used suitcases, duffel bags, or toiletry bags this month. Donated items wil be given to local children in foster care through Family Builders of Catawba Valley, part of Catawba County Social Services. FOSFTL Book Sale News— a Timely Update from Susan Hunsucker



Beginning Monday, Nov. 6, Christmas-themed books and DVDs for both children and adults will be available for sale. The price, as always, is \$1.00 for adult hardcovers and \$.50 for paperbacks. Children's books are \$.25. All DVDs are \$1.00. And, as always, the condition is Rated G:

Good to Great.

Any VC Andrews fans? You will find an entire shelf (30!) of paperbacks.

Another generous patron recently donated 2+ shelves of Nora Roberts paperbacks. Fewer than a dozen remain. More Nora Roberts (JD Robb) may soon be available. So check the shelves often! And we get "coffee table" books on all subjects donated, too, just right for gifts.

You will also find a good selection of DVDs for adults.. DVDs for children, however, are never on the shelf more than a few days.

Keep in mind that books for adults and children, especially, are always needed. Condition and age are so important!!! Donated books should be in good-to-like-new condition and, with the exception of Classics, not old and yellowed. Hardcover books should have their covers (dust jackets). Patrons want to read the inside cover description to see what the book is about (and whether or not they have read it already!). Rarely is a book lacking a dust jacket available at our book sale.

PLEASE do not donate college textbooks, Readers Digest Condensed Books, almanacs, instruction manuals, books that smell (cigarettes), are moldy or dirty, or that have been mistaken for a chew toy by the puppy! Yes, all of these have been donated and have to be recycled or trashed.

The Friends' ongoing Book Sale is a win-win-win! Our community has a convenient place to donate the books they no longer need or want, the sale has a good selection of books for purchase, and the money generated from the sale is used to aid in financing children's and adult programs and activities, as well as items needed by our branch library that might not be in its budget. (BTW, this is now the sole FOSFTL fund raiser.)
