Lively Pictures Enliven Our Environs



children's and adult's books—that of our endless striving for affection and acceptance.

<u>Bee My Valentine</u>, by Miriam Cohen, finds the first-graders excited about the cards they will receive. This book is part of the "We Love First Grade" series, featuring social and emotional





learning. If you remember a time when the cards were passed out and you didn't receive one from your favorite classmate, you will empathize with the characters of the story.

Many other Valentine books are readily available—come into the library and have a look!



Ladybugs Took the Stage in January

Ladybugs are a beautiful and helpful addition to our gardens, where they feast on aphids and other harmful garden pests. Even though January is not a ladybug-friendly month, Barbara MacArthur featured the little creatures as her Kraft Kit subject.

The many children's books starring the ladybug include those in the picture. One series, by Julia Donaldson, begins with What the Ladybug Heard. This story about Ladybug overhearing a plan by Hefty Hugh and Lanky Len to steal the farmer's prize cow may qualify as a child's first mystery story. It was the winner of the 2011 Bank Street "Best Children's Book of the Year" and it was followed by What the Ladybug Heard Next and What the Ladybug Heard at the Zoo. Other Ladybug books are also popular, so Barbara designed a three dimensional ladybug to remind children that spring is on the way, and that insects are ecologically indispensable. Of course, those January Kraft Kits have long since flitted away just like their real counterparts!

Help Wanted: Another Two Hands For Krafts-4-Kids

We need a friend of the library to help with the Friendly Krafts 4 Kids. This committee is currently designing and packaging the Kraft Kits that are available to our pre-school and kindergarten-age patrons once a month in the lobby of the library.

- 1) What would I have to do?
- Design a project kit for 35 to 40 children once every four months. Send description and photos of your kit to the newsletter editor and the social media chair.
- 2) How much time would this take?

On average, most project kits take three to four hours to assemble and package. Therefore, your time commitment for a year is ONLY 10 or 12 hours.



- 3) How much would I have to spend?

 Nothing, our committee is funded by the FOL. Receipts for supplies can be submitted for reimbursement or you can donate your personal funds to the cause. On average, the cost per month for the 35-40 kits is less than \$10 for supplies.
- 4) But I'm not a crafty person, how can I do this? Many ideas for literacy based Kraft projects are on the internet. Pinterest is an excellent source of ideas.

To date this committee has completed over 1200 project kits for the children of the library. Please consider donating your time.

Professor Richard Eller Discusses Catawba County's Role in Prohibition: A Local Aspect of "The Roaring Twenties" March 26, 6:30 meet-&-greet

Catawba County Museum of History's Historian in Residence and Catawba Valley Community College history professor Richard Eller will speak about his latest book iin progress, on the era of prohibition, focusing particularly on Catawba County and western North Carolina.

We will again have a special pre-event meet-and-greet for members only at 6:30, followed by the public program from 7-9, March 26th at the library.

Finding a way to involve people in a good story about the past to help them navigate their future is what drives Richard Eller as an historian, a teacher and a writer. His work includes the history of Piedmont Airlines, the <u>Miracle of Hickory</u> about the 1944 polio epidemic, and a volume on the western North Carolina furniture industry. Professor Eller has also written articles about local subjects for Foothills Digest, the Hickory Daily Record, and Focus.



His recent works include <u>Hickory Then & Now</u>, <u>Hickory: A Complete History</u>, and a documentary film and book about the 1964 Ridgeview High School Panthers football team entitled <u>Untouchable: The Perfect Season of the 1964 Ridgeview High Panthers</u>. With his wife, Claudia Ward, he has just completed a book on a Hickory couple, and is working on a triple biography of Civil War generals with his daughter, Suzanne Mayo. He also serves as Executive Director of Redhawk Publications, a CVCC initiative that brings regional and national authors to a reading audience. He has several more projects in the works, too many to mention, but approaches life much like Gutzon Borglum, engaging in "six wars at a time." He is a grandfather of four (his "best accomplishments"): Ian, Piper, Eli, and Charlie.

Our Library System Receives Awards

The Catawba County Library has received four awards from the North Carolina Public Library Director Association:

- one each for the renovations at the Southwest Branch and the St. Stephens Branch;
- one for the "Tales in the Garden" bilingual story times; and
- the Ryan Dowd and Mental Health First Aid Award for staff training and solutions surrounding patrons with mental health, homelessness, and drug addiction.
