Greetings from the President


Greetings, Friends!

Fireflies Lit Up August's Kraft

Kathy Bradham's Friendly Kraft-4-Kids focused on a beautiful sight during our August evenings: the familiar flurry of fireflies we enjoy while waiting for bedtime.

Starting with a little glue, three pieces of construction paper, and a red crayon, this firefly even had wings! (But he couldn't get too close to the fire...)

The August Kraft was linked to Eric Carle's colorful <u>The Very Lonely Firefly.</u> And in tune with our "Friendly" theme, the story highlights a firefly's search for his friends. And so <u>our firefly went searching for his friends.</u> "Wait! What are those lights ahead? Are those my buddies?" What will our firefly meet along the way? Will he find his friends? These and other adventures are the story's plot, and beneath the obvious storyline lie issues

like loneliness, the importance of friends, and the awareness of insects. A very meaningful book.

September's Kraft Is Full of Fishing Fun!

It may seem that summer's over, but here in North Carolina we won't have to stay indoors for several more months and there's still time to go fishing. So **Christine Rupolo** linked her September Friendly Kraft-4-Kids to popular books featuring fish, of course!

<u>The Rainbow Fish</u> was first published in 1992 by Swiss author and illustrator Marcus Pfister and has been followed by a series of other books, all celebrating the idea that true happiness comes from giving to others rather than hoarding possessions.

The book is an international bestseller and has been translated into over 50 languages and adapted into an animated television series.

The pfish in question (you knew we weren't going to let that slide, didn't you...) is proud of his shiny, foil scales but lonely due to his beauty. After seeking advice from a wise octopus, he learns to share his scales with other fish, bringing him joy and happiness, (at least on a small scale).

Other books available from the library which share the themes of fish and the sea are:

<u>Going for a Sea Bath</u>, by Andree Poulin/Anne-Claire Delisle; <u>The Fish of Small Wishes</u>, by Elana K.

Arnold. (We hope that is to be followed by "The Wish of Small Fishes.)

As you can see from the picture, a paper plate is transformed into a happy fish, with lovely multi-colored scales and a tail. So when you're listening to your angler telling his/her next "fish story," remember the phishy, wishy, piscatorial subjects of September.





FOSFTL Grade School Literacy Programs GROW!

The First- and Second-grade Literacy Programs have an exciting year ahead! We have assembled a **total of eleven** volunteers **including five new** volunteers! Two of our new members, **Tina Huber** and **Kathryn Baranackie**, have stepped up to co-chair our growing Second-grade program. Thanks to **Tammy Hallman** who did a fantastic job leading this program for the past few years! (Library Services Manager **Shelley Orr** is also pictured because she is sending and collecting supplies/info on getting library cards.)

First-grade volunteers will again be reading four times this year at Sherrills Ford Elementary, Catawba Elementary, and Balls Creek Elementary—a total of sixteen classrooms. In the 45 minutes we spend with the students, we read a book and do a fun craft activity related to the content.

Second-grade readers will visit Sherrills Ford Elementary and Catawba Elementary four times this year, reading to a total of eight classrooms. After the book is read, our readers engage the students to discuss key elements of the book.
