
Greetings from the President

December's Krafts-4-Kids Addresses Mitten Matters on a Cold Day

The story is based on a Ukrainian folktale, featuring Nicki, who loses his snow-white mitten in the snow.

A mole crawls in to get warm, followed by a rabbit, a hedgehog, an owl, a badger, and a fox. As the next animal—a bear!—squeezes in, it is followed by a mouse. The mouse's whiskers tickle the bear's nose, causing him to sneeze and this sends all the animals flying out of the mitten. As the mitten flies through the air, Nicki spots it and retrieves it.

As usual, it requires only a glue stick and a bit of coloring to transform the parts into a colorful mitten. (Now, is this the lost mitten, or the one remaining with Nicki...?)

Susan Hunsucker Retires from the Book Bonanza

After 15 years of sorting, cleaning, repairing and shelving donated books, **Susan Hunsucker** is relinquishing her role as the keeper of the FOSFTL flame—and its #1 fundraiser.

Susan says, "It's been a labor of love." And she means it! She has a

passion for books, but the "labor" ingredient has taken its toll. Last month, Susan spent 37 hours working on the Book Bonanza. This includes unpacking, sorting, and cleaning donated books, pulling outdated titles, and keeping notes. A typical month involves at least 25 hours of volunteer time. You can see why we have decided to transition the Book Bonanza to a committee effort!

The Book Bonanza (so titled not only for the alliterative appeal, but also to avoid any possible legal entanglements for a non-profit) has a history going back to the old library "down the road." The Friends of the Library used to hold a book sale at its fall festival event. It was a huge undertaking because all of the books had to be hauled out just for the day and then packed back up and stored. Susan decided that the sensible thing to do was to offer the books year-round. "I had never done this before, but I knew it was easier than hauling those books around," she said.

Over the years, Susan has developed an efficient system for keeping track of the books for sale on the shelves. Each book gets a small round sticker on its spine when it is put out. The stickers are color-coded by month and she often picks colors related to the season, e.g. green for December/Christmas. Any book that is unsold after three months is pulled and donated, either to the main library in Newton (where it sold to ThriftBooks.com) or to the FOSFTL's Little Free Library. This system has been so successful that it has now been adopted by other library branches.


Because the Book Bonanza is FOSFTL's biggest fundraiser, Susan emphasizes that the condition of the books is crucial to the success of the sale.. She insists that all hardbacks must have jackets, and if the jackets are torn, Susan repairs them. She carefully removes any written references to the former owners (by erasure or whiteout/blackout if necessary) and flips through all the pages to remove receipts or bookmarks or turned-down corners. In addition, stickers are removed by hand and Goo-B-gone is a vital supply!

The price of the books at the Book Bonanza is always affordable, and is 33% less than the prices at the main library. When "coffee-table" books arrive, the bargains can be astounding.

But the best bargains are children's books. As part of FOSFTL's mission for literacy and also Susan's focus on encouraging children to read, children's titles are priced at only 25 cents. And children's books are accepted in any reasonable condition. And do they ever fly off the shelves!

In nearly every edition of *The Friendly News*, there is a blurb reminding readers that the Book Bonanza is FOSFTL's ESSENTIAL fundraiser and that books of all kinds and descriptions are ALWAYS needed. Help fill up our shelves!

Joyce O'Neal's Ninth Annual Piano Recital Featured the "Famous and Forgotten"

The evening's program presented compositions ranging from 1818 to 1950; a span of time beginning with the weak, tinny "fortepiano" of Mozart's age to the robust, full-voiced grand of our time.

A special guest, Piers DiMartino, began the program with Sergei Prokofiev's Opus 75, No. 6—a rousing and challenging example of virtuoso piano composition. We hope to hear Piers again!

Images of each composer were projected, including portraits of Franz Mozart (Wolfgang Amadeus' youngest son), an 1848 photograph of Frédéric Chopin,

Diederich Krug, Camille Saint-Saëns, Isaac Albéniz, George and Ira Gershwin, Paul Hindemith, and York Bowen.

Some of these men were famous and popular in their

own time, but quickly forgotten after their demise. Others remain famous to this day. But when music could only be heard if you were within



earshot of a musician, thousands of composers toiled at their craft. A short selection of typical compositions of the past offers a glimpse into the "Golden Age of the Piano," when sales of printed music were the composer's goal and measure of popularity.

cooperation with this project. The Amazon Gift Card was chosen because there is no service fee and no sales tax charged for it.










Check any opportunities below that catch your eye—we'll be in touch! Teens may be eligible to earn school volunteer hours.

Officer Roles – Serve as President, Vice President, Treasurer, or Secretary (2-year term)
Nominating Committee – Help identify and recruit qualified Officers and Board Members during election cycles and as vacancies arise
Fundraising Committee – Develop and support fundraising strategies and create campaigns that support the library's programs and goals
Book Bonanza Committee – Ensure a steady supply of books for our sales by assisting with book collection, sorting, and inventory management
Family Holiday Event – Assist with planning and/or helping on the day of our December celebration
Literacy Program – Support early literacy by selecting books, assembling reading packets, or reading in classrooms (Grades 1–2)
Community Advocacy Committee – Promote the library and its programs, and build community support
Membership Committee – Support member outreach, renewals, thank-you emails, and event table staffing
Program Committee – Collaborate with the library to brainstorm, plan, and run programs and events
Refreshments/Roadies Team – Provide and serve refreshments, and assist with event setup/cleanup
Publicity Committee – Coordinate and expand publicity efforts
Art Show Committee – Coordinate collection, library display, and return of student artwork to local schools
Little Free Library Committee – Help stock and maintain Little Free Libraries throughout the community and track any needed kiosk repairs
Friendly Krafts 4 Kids Committee – Create and organize literacy-themed "Take and Make" craft kits for young library patrons
