These officials brought three gallons of moonshine which they said they obtained near an Angels house—not the angels we read about in the Book.

They found a sixty gallon capacity still near Rockford bridge on the South Fork river. Two men were there, just finishing a run. They ran, of course, but the officers were close enough to know who they were.

Five gallons of liquor was at the still, but all material for making liquor had been used in the run that was being finished up.

Three gallons of liquor were found at the house of Felton Bollinger. This was brought to Newton and poured out here. The copper still was
